### Seniors Socialize in the Heart of Guildwood

After retiring as a full-time
Professor with Centennial College,
I stayed within the teaching
profession by initially being
accepted back on contract on an
individual per semester basis. I
was then approached by a private
career college to design and
develop an online travel program.

When the pandemic started, even that opportunity had to come to a close so it was a perfect opportunity to join our local Probus-Guildwood club that I had been considering, but putting off until my workload eased.

Probus (**PRO**fessional **BUS**iness) is a worldwide organization of about 350,000 members in 27 countries and our Guildwood club is one of about 250 in Canada. Quarterly newsletters on the Canada and Global websites, and meetings on Zoom, offer a great opportunity to meet and talk with other participants, and to encourage the multicultural aspects of the organization. That being said, it's important to note that our constitution does not allow any religious or political activities.

In Guildwood, we have 120 members (and still growing)! We pay only \$25 a year for fees plus a one-time initiation fee of \$25, which includes the club badge. This is a great price considering we have nine meetings a year in the Guildwood Presbyterian Church hall, with a wide selection of guest speakers. Speakers have entertained us with talks on World War 2, Canadian History and Inventions, electric vehicles, wildlife photography, analysis of handwriting and many other interesting topics.



In addition, the popular monthly "Lunch With Friends" has us going to a variety of pre-selected restaurants in the area where there is a more relaxed opportunity to enjoy companionship and lively discussions.

Our monthly newsletter covers all the activities of the previous month, plus informs everyone of what is coming up in the next few weeks and months. On the schedule, there are theater visits and outings to an alpaca farm, and even a trip to a small local store where we were able to decant and fill dozens of bottles of red and white wine –

even labelled them with our own logo and name!



One event we are very proud of was a musical concert given by the Ukrainian refugee family that settled in our community in 2022. Before an audience of 95 members and guests, they entertained us with a selection of music



on banduras, a guitar and violin, and even a unique water pipe. The whole concert was taped and published on YouTube. A quilt was raffled and from those ticket sales, together with a donation from the club, we were able to present a cheque for \$1,000 to the family.

Our website is very active and is constantly updated to keep up with the many activities that are important, not just to our own members, but to the Guildwood community at large. The home page shows the year's selections of Lunches, Speakers, and Events, as well as links to local events in the Scarborough area.

# Looking Back and Ahead at Guild Park in 2024

Guild Park & Gardens continues to build its reputation as a place for fun and inspiration amid 88 acres of art and nature. Here's a recap of this year's highlights from the perspective of park volunteers.

Also included are recommendations for the park's future, courtesy of a City-sponsored arts group that came to Guild Park for the first time in 2024. Their art program included a series of popular summer events on-site. From this experience, the group recognized that Guild Park is "rich with potential for arts and community engagement" and specified how "to enhance the park's capacity to host arts-related events and improve the overall visitor experience."

#### **Guild Park in Action**

Alive with Art: This summer's two-day arts festival, Guild Alive With Culture, attracted a record number of artists, artisans and community reps to the park's formal gardens.



Event visitors saw hundreds of displays for hand-made art and products. Meanwhile, musicians played at the Greek Theatre all weekend under the shining sun. The festival, now in its 17th year, is organized by local City Councillor Paul Ainslie and community supporters.

Community Focus: The GVCA's Guildwood Day BBQ always takes centre stage at Guild Park on the first Saturday in June. Again this year, thousands of Guildwood residents came to enjoy the benefits of their GVCA membership with families, friends and neighbours.

Success On Stage: Guild Festival Theatre (GFT), Guild Park's resident professional theatre group, brought comedy and drama, plus family-focused music and entertainment to the outdoor marble stage for its 13th season. This year's audience included Mayor Olivia Chow, who enjoyed the magic of GFT's Family Fest.

Performers & Poets: Thanks to Toronto's Arts In the Parks program, Guild Park visitors experienced the rhythms and rhymes of the always popular Nagata Shachu drummers, and the poetry reading series organized by the group, Tender Possibilities.

Walks to Discover: A variety of guided tours, park walks, clean-ups and nature talks revealed the site's stories and secrets to visitors of all ages. Local volunteers from Friends of Guild Park collaborated with Heritage Toronto, Doors Open, Jane's Walks, National Trust for Canada, Ocean Wise, the David Suzuki Foundation, Park People and other organizations on these popular activities.

Trees of Valour: Guild Park's pair of historic Vimy Oaks are now suitably identified. This spring, local federal politician and Guild Park supporter, John McKay, arranged to have a descriptive plaque installed for these trees.

A Garden of Delight: Guildwood Butterflyway members and other volunteer gardeners tended the park's Pollinator Garden all summer long. This now-thriving habitat of milkweed and other native species has created a thriving butterfly "factory" beside Guild Park's well-visited Sculptor's Cabin.

Greening Guildwood: Another volunteer effort that strengthened our local ecosystem came in June when more than 1,000 native trees and shrubs were distributed to local residents. This initiative by the Guildwood Butterflyway group, Friends of Guild Park and the GVCA is supported by City of Toronto Parks, Forestry & Recreation.

#### What's Ahead

All this activity puts a spotlight on Guild Park's key role as a community and city-wide hub for art and nature. The events hosted on the site – both outdoors and inside the park's three buildings – are now estimated to attract more than 200,000 visitors a year. This is at least 10 times more than 15 years ago, when the grounds were neglected and the buildings boarded up.

The challenge today is operating Guild Park to better serve the thousands more people coming to the site.

An emerging concern involves public safety. On July 13 this year, Toronto Police Services were called to investigate an assault that took place by Guild Park's unimproved waterfront. This is an area where, for the second consecutive summer, people are illegally camping on public land. City officials continue to be alerted about these unauthorized encampments at Guild Park but have yet to take effective action.

#### Four Ways Forward

This summer, an art group sponsored by Toronto Arts In the Parks, brought a new voice to long-standing requests for Guild Park improvements.

The group, Tender Possibilities, hosted a summer-long program of popular poetry readings on the site for the first time. With its community partner, Friends of Guild Park, the group welcomed hundreds of visitors to the park. People came for a series of six outdoor readings, held in rain or

shine, with professional and emerging poets.
This experience gave group founder, Farhia Tato, and her peripatetic group of poetry fans, a good look at Guild Park's current facilities. They compared what's available at Guild Park to other Toronto parks used by Tender Possibilities.

Describing Guild Park as "beautiful and culturally significant," Farhia identified these enhancements to make the site better for all:

- 1. More and better-maintained public washrooms.
- 2. On-site food and beverage services.
- 3. Improved and additional signage throughout the park.
- 4. Adding more benches and seating so visitors can better enjoy the park's natural beauty, while encouraging individual reflection and community interaction.

The arts group noted that Friends of Guild Park continues to advocate for all these improvements, so the site becomes "a more vibrant and welcoming space both for the arts and the public."

The Arts in the Parks-sponsored group looks forward to returning to Guild Park, continuing its successful collaboration with Friends of Guild Park and working with park officials so they recognize "the need for continued investment in this unique cultural site."



### **Youth Employment in Arts & Culture**

Guild Festival Theatre

Another summer season at Guild Festival Theatre has come and gone, and with that, the company bids farewell to the seasonal staff that brought to life our 13th season at Guild Park & Gardens.

While GFT's year-round staff is limited to two Co-Artistic Directors, a General Manager and

a small handful of independent contractors, it takes a lot of seasonal employees and artists to make sure that our productions run smoothly. This summer, Guild Festival Theatre employed 15 actors and designers, 11 production and box office staff, and 4 other administrative staff members between May and September. That's a total of 30 temporary/seasonal staff in 2024 alone!

In past years, this staffing was supported in large part by the Canada Summer Jobs Program - a government-funded initiative that provides wage subsidies to employers to create quality summer work experiences for young people aged 15 to 30 years at small businesses and not-for-profit companies. This program enables organizations like Guild Festival Theatre to provide meaningful summer work in the arts to youth looking for summer employment at Scarborough's only professional theatre.

The media is rife with stories of youth unemployment - and the ever-competitive job market in the arts means that there are fewer and fewer opportunities for young artists and arts workers to gain professional experience. In June 2024, Youth Unemployment in Canada reached 13.5%, and Canada's overall unemployment rate hit 6.6% in August.

In 2022, Guild Festival Theatre was approved to hire 18 youth through Canada Summer Jobs whereas in 2023, we were only approved to hire three. This past year, that number was reduced to only one. And we've heard similar stories from colleagues across the country.

But as we say in the theatre, the show must go on! Drawing on other funding sources, including running an ambitious fundraising campaign, Guild Festival Theatre was able to present two productions, Family Fest, and special events and initiatives throughout the summer such as SPIN, and the Scarborough Discovery Drive. This work was supported by 14 youth employees at GFT - many of them Scarborough locals - who gained valuable experience working in a professional summer theatre. This summer's Marketing and Communications Assistant Bonnie Duff says:

"Though I came to GFT with experience in theatre, both onstage and off, the opportunity to work and learn about theatre administration specifically through the lens of marketing not only allowed me to gain valuable professional experience with a company whose work I've been excited about for years, but also grow my skill set in a market that will support my future artistic projects... and pay my rent while doing it! GFT has been a wonderful step in the difficult cycle for young people where you need a job to get experience, but you need experience to get the job."

We are so grateful for the audiences that join us at the iconic Greek Theatre every summer, and for the generous donors that make it possible for us to offer opportunities for emerging artists and arts workers like Bonnie. As we plan for our 2025 Season, we aim to continue to offer these experiences for youth and young artists, and the support we receive through our Donor Ecosystem makes this possible. # I Know A Park Summer poetry sessions at Guild Park inspire a verse

As part of the 2024 Arts In the Parks (AITP) program, a Toronto group came to Guild Park this summer to hold a popular series of Sunday poetry readings.

The group, called Tender Possibilities, brought together more than 30 young adults each afternoon. They shared verses and discussed various poetic themes outdoors, rain or shine, amid the park's inspiring nature and art.

These gatherings of poets and participants were organized by Farhia Tato, who founded the group and previously held readings in other parts of Toronto. In Guild Park this year, she and the Tender Possibilities team discovered a place they described as full of "possibility and imagination."

The volunteer organization that I lead, Friends of Guild Park, was selected as AITP's community partner for Farhia's initiative. We shared the park's Sculptor's Cabin as a gathering space. Also, our park volunteers helped participants, many of whom were first-time park visitors, find their way around the park and appreciate the site's history and artistic legacy.

#### I Know A Park

### Presenting Dea Mehilli



# An Update from Gary Anandasangaree, MP Scarborough-Rouge Park



Dear Guildwood.

I hope you all had an exciting summer with family, friends, and neighbours. It's been a busy few months, and I'm grateful for the opportunity to speak with residents about their hopes and concerns

for our community and country. Whether it's making life more affordable, tackling crime, or securing federal investments in local transit, housing, and infrastructure, I remain focused on serving all of you.

#### Cracking Down on Auto Theft:

I know many residents are concerned about auto theft in our community and across Ontario. I want to reassure you that the federal government is actively working with provinces, manufacturers, shippers, and police to tackle this issue head-on. Over the past six months, auto thefts have decreased by 17% nationally and 14% in Ontario. We will continue to drive these numbers down further and keep Canadians and their property safe.

- Tougher criminal penalties for auto theft offences and cracking down on the sale, possession, distribution, and import of devices commonly used to steal cars.
- New scanning tools and enhancements to the Canada Border Service Agency's anti-smuggling efforts, including the deployment of a mobile X-ray scanner in the GTA. These improvements have already led to the interception of 1,205 stolen vehicles in railyards and ports across Canada as of May 20, 2024.
- \$121 million to Ontario police services to help them disrupt, dismantle, and prosecute the organized crime groups involved in auto theft.
- \$28 million to the Canada Border Services Agency to ensure they can scan outbound rail and shipping containers for stolen cars.

#### Affordable Dental Care for nearly 650,000 Canadians:

We are delivering on our promise to help more Canadians access dental care and make life more affordable for families, seniors, and children. As of early September, nearly 650,000 Canadians received dental care, and 2.4 million are now covered under the Canadian Dental Care Plan (CDCP).

The CDCP is set to provide affordable dental care to up to nine million uninsured Canadians, making it one of the largest social programs in Canadian history. Currently, the CDCP is open to eligible seniors aged 65 or above, adults with a valid Disability Tax Credit Certificate, and children under 18, covering services such as cleanings, fillings, dentures, and more. Even more Canadians will be eligible for the CDCP starting in 2025.

# First Gear Driver Education Helps Youth Prepare for their G1 Driver's Licence

This October, Toronto Police 43 Division ran First Gear Driver Education and launched a five-week program aimed at helping approximately 20 students obtain their G1 driver's licence. Running on Saturdays, the program was a collaborative effort that brought together experts from organizations such as the Ministry of Transportation Ontario (MTO), the

Canadian Automobile Association (CAA), Mothers Against Drunk Driving (MADD), and the Toronto Police Service (TPS) traffic unit.

The program prepares students for the G1 exam and equips them with the knowledge to make safe choices on the road. By educating young drivers, the initiative hopes to reduce the risks of aggressive driving and illegal street activities in the future.

The Children's Breakfast Club and ProAction Cops and Kids generously support the program, which is offered free of charge to participants. Each student receives study materials, lunch, and the fees for their G1 licence—all covered at a value of approximately \$250 per student. In addition to preparing students for the exam, the program fosters stronger connections between police officers and youth in the 43 Division community, building

trust and ensuring safer roads for everyone.



# **Community Safety in Scarborough-Rouge Park**

It was wonderful to see so many of you at our Harvest Fest in September. Thank you to all of our community members who brought locally-grown produce and craft goods, and our performers for showing

off the talent we have in Scarborough-Rouge Park. I hope everyone enjoyed themselves and I look forward to seeing you again next year.

#### **Toronto Community Crisis Service**

To improve community safety and better respond to mental health crisis calls, Toronto Council approved the Toronto Community Crisis Service (TCCS) in 2021. The service provides a non-police-led, community-based, client-centred, and trauma-informed response to mental health crisis calls and wellness checks.

The TCCS provides free, confidential, in-person mental health support from mobile crisis worker teams. The service can also provide referrals and connections to other services and post-crisis follow up support. The service is fully deployed in Scarborough and is available 24 hours a day, seven days a week. TCCS crisis workers wear green lanyards and carry identification cards. The City of Toronto logo is on all TCCS vehicles, along with the logos of community partners.

If you or someone you know is experiencing a mental health crisis, or needs a wellness check, you can call 211 or 911 to access the Toronto Community Crisis Service.

#### We Need to 'Solve the Crisis' Together

I have the honour of representing Toronto at the Ontario's Big City Mayors (OBCM) meetings. We have launched the 'Solve the Crisis' campaign to take action on homelessness, addiction and mental health. The campaign requests the provincial government to:

- Appoint a single Minister to address the full spectrum of housing needs, as well as mental health and addictions;
- Strike a task force with stakeholders to develop a *Made in Ontario Action Plan*;
- Provide municipalities with tools and resources to transition those in encampments to more appropriate supports:
- Commit to funding the appropriate services these individuals need; and
- Invest in 24/7 Community Hubs/Crisis Centres.

The impacts of homelessness are growing in Toronto. We have more than 12,000 people in our shelter system, we turn away an average of 226 people daily, and we have more than 430 encampments. In Toronto, 76% of people experiencing homelessness have one or more health issues, including addiction, mental health, or chronic medical conditions.

Mental health and addiction have significant impacts on our municipal services. Paramedic response times have increased by 14%, and 60% of their time is spent in hospital. Similarly, Toronto Police spend an average of two hours in hospital to admit a mental health patient: this time spent in hospital annually is the equivalent of 20 full-time officers.

To relieve pressure on emergency centres and first responders, we need crisis centres across Toronto, including in Scarborough. I will continue this advocacy as I represent our beautiful community of Scarborough-Rouge Park at Toronto City Hall.


